Walking the High Wire

Remember the Flying Wallendas? The Flying Wallendas were a family, who, into the 1970's, fascinated millions with their high wire circus act in circuses. When performing, they never used a net.

Many, even today, remember the tragic accidents which meant death and disability to family members. After one accident where one member was killed and others seriously injured, a reporter went to interview the father of the family, Karl Wallenda, who was known as the "Great" Wallenda.

When the reporter arrived at the circus on the morning after the accident, which killed and injured others of Wallenda's family, he was told that Mr. Wallenda was in the circus tent practicing. The reporter had to yell him down from the wire and then asked, "What are you doing? Your family is in mourning over a death not 24 hours ago, and you are up walking the wire. When are you going to give this up?"

The Great Wallenda looked at the reporter and said, "To be on the wire is life, all else is simply waiting."

Jesus says in Matthew, "Anyone who finds his life will lose it, and anyone who loses his life for my sake will find it." (Matt. 10:39)

Walking the high wire is not here equated with "finding life" in service to the Kingdom of God, with discipleship. The element of risk, however, is! How many people sit on life's bank, shivering, afraid to jump in - - not knowing that they are colder on the bank than they would ever be in the water?

How many people do you know who have built the perfect lifesavings security in a bank book, but who have never really lived because they have played it safe, avoided taking even the slightest of risks? How many people do you know who have found a religion, but never a relationship?

We hold a mistaken image about the boomerang. Ask anyone, and they will tell you that a boomerang is something you fling out to the right of you and, properly thrown, will make a full circle in front of you and land at your feet. That might be the way we use the "wham-o" one we buy in the toy department, but that was not its intended use. A boomerang is for hunting. If you hit your target, you made a catch. Only when you missed your target did the boomerang come back to your feet.

How many of us have, at one time or another, thought of extending ourselves in service to others, only to miss the target on the first try – then to have said, "forget it" -- and then have allowed the extended hand to pull back, quickly, until both our arms are wrapped around ourselves with the pledge that we will never get burnt like that again?

Much of ministry involves prying loose our hurt and frustrated arms from around ourselves— and entertaining that we, yes, we, again risk reaching, loving, caring —risk anything of significance for crying out loud! --until the life promised by the Kingdom is found.

Mark Twain said, "Go out on a limb. That's where the fruit is." We are told the fruit is tasty, but we fail to step toward it.

When a sudden gust of wind came up while Karl Wallenda was walking the high wire in Puerto Rico at the age of 73, falling awkwardly to his death, I was silent with quiet and shock as the image flashed on the television screen. But I did not shed a tear.

Instead, I remembered the words of a man who inspired me and many others, the one who said, "To be on the wire is life; everything else is simply waiting."

June was a challenging month for our endowment - our Sagepoint account lost \$9,000 in value during that period, bringing our total investment loss for the year to \$23,000, or about -11%. Compared to the markets (DOW -9%, S&P -9.8%, NASDAQ -25%), we are probably doing as well as we can in the current economic climate. The vestry will continue to review the status of our funds monthly. On the plus side, we still have not had to withdraw any monies from this account this year to apply to operating expenses.

So far this year our pledges have increased somewhat from last year and are very slightly exceeding our budget - you have pledged over \$23,000 this year compared to our budget estimate of \$20,500.

We recently received a quote from Procrafters Roofing to make a number of needed repairs to the church roof. The vestry agreed to transfer the \$1,990 required from the Vestry Discretionary account to the Operating account to pay for the repairs.

One curious bill we received this month - the water bill from Marshalltown Water Works. The bill noted that we used so little water during the past billing cycle that the meter registered zero use. The bill totaled \$175. A call to MWW revealed that this amount is the minimum charge for a commercial building. Even though we had no water going down the drains, they wouldn't even waive the sewer fees. Just another challenge in the daily operation of \$1. Paul's.

Our recent employee hires, Kim Curley and Andrew Thelen, are working out well. Kim is keeping the church well cleaned, and having Andrew play on alternate Sundays is a nice addition to our services.


