

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AREFLECTION

Every day I seem to be word-processing something -- writing or replying to an email or composing a letter or a sermon or even an article for our newsletter.

As I poke at the keyboard, I get flagged when I place a space where one should not exist. It's the auto-correct function of the computer program that has alerted me and keeps me from putting in my text a space that doesn't belong.

If only we had some sort of fool proof auto-correct function of our hearts and minds that kept us from putting spaces where they shouldn't exist. Right? It's clear that we don't. We divide ourselves ethnically, racially, regionally, nationally, economically, religiously, and politically.

Moreover, in this world where distinctions are so easily and rigidly drawn, far too often we fail to see that the union that God has knit together includes not just the living, those of us still defined by space and time, but all the faithful of every age who have ever lived or will ever live.

The mystical body of Jesus Christ into which we have been formed includes not just us, but all the faithful who have already gone before us or who will go before us: both the saints of God in ages past and those in years to come.

With the turning of the calendar to the first day of November, All Saints Day, we celebrate our seamless communion with saints of great renown and those who are known to God alone and to perhaps a few others who knew and loved them.

Among these lesser saints are, of course, our own beloved family members and dear friends. We loved them in life, and we miss their physical presence. They taught us right from wrong, inspired us when we had given up hope, believed in us when no one else would, and loved us despite our weaknesses and shortcomings. A tall order, indeed!

These are the dear ones we remember and whose virtuous and godly examples we seek to follow. They're parents and siblings and spouses and children and beloved friends we'll always love and cherish, and they're as vital a part of the mystical body of Jesus Christ as we are.

Yes, their mortal bodies have returned to the dust, and we don't see them as we once did; but their indestructible spirits live on in perpetuity in our hearts.

You might think about All Saints Day like this. In its own way, it provides to our hearts what the auto-correct function of a computer keyboard does to our word-processing. This great Feast alerts us when we wish to place spaces where they don't belong. That is, it reminds us that the God whom we proclaim and truly love in Jesus Christ isn't a God of separation, but of unity and communion.

God doesn't believe in spaces among us, and neither should we.

Do join in praying this prayer not just on November 1 but on each day of November, for we all need its corrective message of unity over division deeply embedded within us.

Almighty God, you have knit together your elect in one communion and fellowship in the mystical body of your Son Christ our Lord: Give us grace so to follow your blessed saints in all virtuous and godly living, that we may come to those ineffable joys that you have prepared for those who truly love you; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who with you and the Holy Spirit lives and reigns, one God, in glory everlasting. Amen.
