
Refreshments consisting of animal crackers will be served.

During the month of August, we finally had the roof on the church repaired. While we didn't need the whole roof replaced, there were some problem areas that need attention, and these were taken care of by Procrafters Roofing.

We are about to receive an estimate for repairs to the bell tower at the main entrance of the church. Ciro DiLorio and his subcontractors have reviewed this part of the church that has been a leaky problem area for a long time and have indicated that the repairs needed will be extensive. Let's keep our fingers crossed and hope it won't be too expensive.

Our pledges are on a good track this year relative to our budget projections - we anticipated July/August pledges to be around \$6,000 and you have given \$6,700 during that period. Your generosity is greatly appreciated.

Matching the crazy cycles of the stock market our endowment, our endowment increased by about \$6,800 in July and then went down by almost the same amount in August, leaving us with a net gain of around \$100. I think the volatility of the markets is going to remain like this for the foreseeable future so we will just have to keep a close watch on the fund.

Last week we installed our community Blessing Box on the Church Street side of the church. A project initiated and headed by the DeMeyer family, it was stocked with food and necessaries last Friday and has seen a great deal of use since the first day. This will be an opportunity for us to help in a tangible way those in our community who are in need.

Anyone can donate to the Blessing Box - if you have anything you would like to contribute, simply drive up and put it in the box, leave it at the church on Sunday or call the office and we can collect it from you and stock the box from here.

I'd like to thank all those who devoted their time, money, and effort to this project, and I know your efforts will go a long way in helping the less fortunate in Marshalltown.

Who is like God? The nine choirs of angels shouted, and Michael, leading the heavenly host, ground the bat-winged dragon beneath his heel, he who once bore light, Lucifer, rocketing to earth on a lightning bolt.

In that moment, Satan, crowned with blackberry brambles, slinks off trailing intrigue like shadows.

Sword drawn, Michael bows before the Son of Man, ready to intercede for those in crisis—his breastplate gleaming like noonday against the fear that stalks in darkness, less a messenger than a warrior, when killing in the name of God was expected.

That's what the old folk say.

And so, as equinox recedes, the days grow short, the meadows rattle with spent blossoms, but Michaelmas daisies flare like blue stars little suns among the weeds.

Stubble stands in harvested fields, carrots and Queen Anne's lace are sorted, the fishermen return to port one last time, nets bursting, home until spring.

The fasting Francis of Assisi rises from his knees: forty days past Ascension, St. Michael's Lent gives over to feast, and there is a moment of luxurious quiet.

Thoughtfully hiding a goose behind the hem of his robe, he has her to dinner, rather than for, offers her a carrot, and smiles.
